Perfect places to pause for a thought

LOOK out for new features which will enhance this year's Remembrance Day in Burbage.

The village, which never forgets the sacrifices made by its local heroes, has two new memorial benches paying homage to the fallen. One wrought iron seat, with an emotive design that shows Tommies amid the horror of the trench warfare that typified World War 1, has been sited alongside the Burbage War Memorial in Church Street. The rose garden memorial, surmounted by its imposing sculpture of a rifleman, was paid for by public subscription and erected after the Great War, with the names of World War 2 fallen later added. The new bench also features red Flanders poppies and that symbol will be repeated along the processional route, with large poppy emblems fixed to street lighting columns.

The other new memorial bench has been sited below the Coronation Tree in Church Street. A Lancaster bomber and Spitfire and Hurricane fighter planes, along with a white dove of reconciliation, are featured on this one so it's readily identified as a Second World War memorial. Together they will form part of a poignant backdrop to Poppy Day in Burbage – it goes ahead on Sunday, 12th November, when the Rev Solomon Bentu, minister at the Burbage Pentecostal Church Centre, will conduct the traditional open-air service following



a parade of standards involving group representatives. The tribute, organised by Burbage Parish Council and Hinckley and District Royal British Legion, starts from Grove Road Infant School at 10.30am and the Armistice service follows at 10-45am.

The war memorial area, praised for its cared-for tranquillity, will be thronged with people – so do please leave your cars at home if possible. Road closures and no waiting zones will be in force on 12th November between 10am and 12 noon and drivers are asked to co-operate in keeping routes clear.

• The Coronation tree – spectacularly illuminated as always – becomes the focal point on Friday, 22nd December, for the community event that says: "Let's get Christmas started." Carols round the tree, when a huge crowd of villagers gathers to get in the festive mood, starts at 6. 30pm (song sheets will be available). Road closures and no waiting restrictions in the area will apply between 6pm and 9pm.



Watching Brief...

If somehow, something seems wrong, then it's fine to find out why

IDENTIFYING people who are most likely to become victims of fraud has been made a prime aim in a sixmonth community outreach project mounted by the Rural Community Council (Leicestershire and Rutland) in association with Age UK. The campaign aims to target those most at risk, telling them how to spot fraudulent activity and how to avoid falling victim to a scam.

It will raise awareness by asking the question "Does something feel wrong?" and invite a positive response by telling potential victims "Find out why it's right to question it." A spokesman for RCC said: "During the programme we are staging free group sessions to make people aware of the dangers. We want to provide information and offer advice, but we need help to reach those most in need of this information."

The group is kick-starting the outreach through a poster campaign.
